NEW ON THE ROSTER: HANK KNOX

The newest member on Latitude45's roster once again proves that "the fresh sound of virtuosity" is not restricted to a specific genre or period. Harpsichordist Hank Knox has been a leading figure of Canada's early music revival for years, being a founding member of the Arion Baroque Ensemble. A regular performing partner of Tafelmusik Baroque Orchestra and the Studio de musique ancienne de Montreal, he is known for both his gracious playing and his thorough understanding of baroque performance practice. Hank Knox directs the Early Music program at McGill University and, in addition to being a William Dawson Scholar since 2003, he in 2008 was awarded the Thomas Binkley prize by Early Music America in recognition of his work in Early Music. His latest recording, released in spring 2009, features excerpts from Handel operas in transcription for harpsichord by Handel and his contemporary William Babel.

NYOC AND ALAIN TRUDEL NOMINATED FOR JUNO

The CD/DVD box set "Selections from the 2009 National Tour" of the National Youth Orchestra of Canada (NYOC) under direction of Alain Trudel has received two nominations

for JUNO awards, the most prestigious Canadian music award. The nomination in the category "Classical Album of the Year: Large Ensemble or Soloist" is testament not only to the exceptional talent of the young musicians, but also to the stimulating leadership of conductor Alain Trudel. The second nomination went to composer Rob Teehan in the category "Classical Composition of the Year" for his piece "Dreams of Flying" which the NYOC commissioned and premiered.

FRANÇOIS HOULE: NEW RECORDING

Ayler Records, a record label specializing in free jazz and improvised music, has just released a new album by Canadian clarinetist-improviser François Houle. "Last seen headed" contains seven spontaneous compositions/improvisations with French bassist Joëlle Léandre and Swedish percussionist Raymond Strid recorded in January 2009 at the "Sons d'Hiver" festival for France Musique's "A l'improvisite" radio broadcasting series. Houle has been playing with Léandre since the early 1990s. On "Last seen headed", their collaboration reaches new heights of excellence and intimacy, much applauded - as can be heard on the recording - by the audience.

ARDITTI QUARTET PREMIERES NEW DUSAPIN CONCERTO

On April 28, 2010, the Arditti Quartet will give the world premiere of a new piece by French composer Pascal Dusapin. For "Hinterland: Hapax for string quartet and orchestra" the Arditti Quartet will join the Lucerne Symphony Orchestra with Jonathan Nott conducting. A second performance is scheduled for the October 2010 Donaueschingen Festival with the SWR Symphony Orchestra under the direction of Sylvain Cambreling. More performances are planned for the winter in Vienna, London and Porto.

ARTIST OF THE MONTH

MARK FEWER: THE VIOLIN WIZARD

Violinist Mark Fewer is about to make a big leap - from Canada to Australia! He will introduce himself down under with John Adam's "El Dharma at Big Sur", a piece perfectly suited to show his out-of-the-box musical wizardry. He will perform this concerto for six-string electric violin on May 1st with the Melbourne Symphony Orchestra, after a recital in Adelaide on April 27 with works by J.S. Bach, Chris Paul Harman and Heinrich Ignaz Biber.

Besides that, Mark Fewer is busy extending his reputation not only as an excellent soloist and chamber musician, but also as an audacious explorer of new sounds and jazz. At the moment, two new pieces are being written for him which are to mix classical and jazz influences in a new, Fewer-specific sound. Canadian jazz saxophonist and composer Phil Dwyer is creating a piece for solo violin, string orchestra and jazz combo inspired by Vivaldi's "Four Seasons" as well as by the famous saxophone player John Coltrane. The premiere is scheduled for November 2010 in Montreal. The second piece is composed by

The Fresh Sound of Virtuosity

Cameron Wilson, a Vancouver-based swing violinist. The idea to create a work for solo violin, orchestra and rhythm section specifically for Mark Fewer arose after Fewer and Wilson performed together a tribute to the great French jazz violinist Stephan Grappeli last year. The premiere is planned to be some time in 2011.

But Mark Fewer has been active in more “classical” areas, too. Soon to appear on the newly founded “Friends of Music” record label of the Smithsonian Institute is his recording of the complete works of Giovanni Pandolfi, a little-known Italian composer of the 1700s. In this “Gypsy baroque music”, as Mark Fewer likes to describe it, he is joined by Ken Slowik, harpsichord, and Myron Lutzke, continuo cello. Besides that, Mark Fewer has recorded the three violin sonatas of Johannes Brahms with pianist Peter Longworth. The CD will be released this summer on Cleveland-based label Azica.
